From Father Ian

I always find it instructive to explain something to children. The very exercise of choosing appropriate words, of aiming for maximum clarity, and not being easily diverted into unnecessary detail, is a recipe for spotting any gaps in my knowledge or things that I have habitually 'fudged' or glossed-over.



And then there is the inviting of questions by children, who rarely disappoint. They often have a way of interrogating a subject that puts the rest of us to shame.

It is much to the credit of the teachers and pupils of Boxgrove Primary School that there is a sufficient bible-knowledge base for connections to be made between the story of Jesus and the liturgical life that we enjoy in the Priory.

I have enjoyed teaching about Palm Sunday and about the way in which we burn some of the Palm crosses to make the ashes for Ash Wednesday, and how these are signs of our failure to be faithful to Jesus who, on Palm Sunday, we call our 'King'. All those 'hosannas' turned into 'crucify him'.

It would be splendid to see more of the children attending on Palm Sunday, joining in the ceremonial and the procession, led by the donkey - a symbol of Christ's humility, and of his Kingship which is all about service to his people.

What shall I do next? Probably some teaching about Maundy Thursday with its footwashing ceremony, its procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the Altar of Repose, the vigil, and the stripping of the altars.

Because Easter is late this year, the Summer Term begins just as we enter the season of Easter, with its fifty days.

I love the way in which Easter, because it is anchored to the Jewish festival of Passover, itself determined by the cycle of the moon, does not fall on the same date each year. This makes for a varying of the texture in the Christian calendar, for different ways and opportunities to teach about the season and experience it.

Parents, you are, of course, fundamentally responsible for your children's practice of the Christian faith. I encourage you to bring them to church, to enrol them in Sunday School, and to take seriously the promises that you made for them at their Christening.

Praying God's blessing on us all.

BOXGROVE PARISH COUNCIL Chairman's Report

The meeting on the 4th of March was an Annual Electors Meeting. A very small amount of business was dealt with by Councillors prior to this meeting.



The Electors Meeting is purely a meeting for you, our electorate, to talk openly with the Council. I am pleased to say an exceptional number of parishioners attended and many subjects were discussed. Ideas for the future: a couple of benches placed at useful locations on the footpath network; adult exercise equipment on the perimeter of the playing field; improvements to upgrade the children's play area. It was suggested that a small sub-committee be formed to deal with this. After this Electors Meeting we all enjoyed some choice refreshments supplied by Boxies and paid for from the Chairman's discretionary allowance, a small sum of money included in the Annual Council Budget.

The foundation work has been started at the Sports Pavilion to enlarge and enhance the facilities within. The cost of this initial work comes from the grant monies that have been collected, notably some from CDC, from the Solar Farm at Templebar and from Inert Recycling, who are filling the old Halnaker Quarry. This will be completed by the month's end, when some serious fund raising will need to take place to finish the project!

Paul Addison, our Public Rights of Way Officer, has embarked on a scheme to add 'Waymarkers' to footpath finger boards indicating routes to the Windmill from the Village. Named the *Windmill Trail*, this will be helpful to visitors to the Parish to enjoy the various routes across the common and eventually to the Windmill. I wish to thank David Maltby and his company 'Supersigns' of Chichester for making up the discs, to Paul's specific order, free of charge. Yet another highly valued member of our Community!

Preparations are underway for the forthcoming Local Elections, which will take place on May 2^{nd} ; the Polling Station will once again be in the St Blaise Centre. These are for your Parish Council and the District Council Members, and I implore you all to cast your vote. Turn-out in this Ward is better than most areas, but I would like to see a higher percentage of voters. I have made it clear that due to changes made by the Boundaries Commission, our Ward is now designated the Goodwood Ward as of 2^{nd} May: it is the same as the Boxgrove Ward but with the addition now of the Westhampnett Parish.

As I write this, we are faced with a dreadful decision by Stagecoach buses to suspend the 55 bus route through Halnaker and Boxgrove for about 4 weeks! This is due to the closure of Stane Street between Maudlin and Strettington. I personally visited their office in Chichester, sent several emails to their Officers, spoke to the Portsmouth Water engineer on site, and a letter of protest from a Parishioner to the Observer appeared on 14th March, but just now there appears to be no resolution of the situation. We are all aware of the most logical detour which should have been implemented, but seemingly the route planners can't see it! I sincerely hope they can see sense and alter it.

THE OPTIMISTIC GARDENER

High Trees - March 2019 - No.22

The Optimistic Gardener

Weird, Wonderful and Wonky

Morrison's were not the first to come up with the term for their seconds on the vegetable aisle as "wonky". I have been growing wonky vegetables for years. (Remember the many-pronged carrots from my last article?) At High Trees we don't grow vegetables for show but for taste, and over the course of thirty+ years I have tried many weird and wonderful crops. One of the reasons for this is because we became members of the Henry Doubleday Association (sadly now renamed <u>Garden</u> <u>Organic</u> - a name which is "what it says on the tin" but doesn't hint at the history of the society).

A sideline of *Garden Organic* is a seed collection of heritage seeds which can't be sold directly as they are not registered. But on becoming a member of the Heritage Seed Library - on payment of a small fee - you are sent a catalogue annually, containing

about 150 varieties from a collection of about 800, and can choose to be sent six packets to grow. In the past we have had some from which we still continue to save the seeds, but many bloomers as well (and not those of the flowering type). One year we chose to grow a climbing vegetable called **Achocha** - *Cyclanthera* pedata. In the catalogue we were told that this would be the perfect vegetable to use if you were considering putting on a production of *The Day of the Triffids* - but we weren't deterred! The catalogue also mentioned it as being one of the lost crops of the Incas and wondered however they lost it in the first place! You get the idea?



Achocha

The fruit is like a little green hedgehog and equally as digestible! Don't call the RSPCA - I've never actually tried hedgehog! Achocha is rather tasteless and watery but quite a talking point when you find one nestling under the lettuce leaves in a salad.



Mashua

Another beast we grew was a member of the nasturtium family called **Mashua**, *Tropaeolum tuberosum*. As with other members of the nasturtium family this plant positively romps once it has its roots in the soil. It could well make the cast of the Wyndham production alongside Achocha. We grew one tuber and it eventually covered a sweet pea frame eight feet wide by six feet high. It was not a great decision to allow it to scramble up the sweet pea frame, which blew over in a gale due to the sail-like qualities of the crop. It is a root grown along with potatoes and many others in the Andes and is a natural diuretic. Not only that, but I have read that it is a natural lice killer and is alleged to suppress sexual appetite in men! Another one we won't be growing again!



Oca

One that will be given bed-room again is another Andean root crop called **Oca**, *Oxalis tuberosa*. This is a member of the oxalis family with its pretty three-part leaves which are edible but not as pretty as the roots themselves, which gleam. They look like a polished Jerusalem artichoke but have a completely different flavour and no devastating after-effect. I cook them roasted and they only need 25 minutes in the oven - with a taste a little like a lemony potato.

The drawback in growing this crop is the fact that they are nowhere near as prolific as other tubers and need to be grown with good spacing. When I first grew them I only had two plants and enjoyed their flavour so much that the following year I had

about 20 tubers and squeezed 15 of them into one of my raised beds $(12' \times 4')$, which meant that each tuber produced small numbers of small-sized ocas. Last year 1 tried seven tubers in the same space and planted the other five in the greenhouse soil after the tomatoes had finished. Oca only begin to produce the edible tubers after the autumn equinox so makes good use of the greenhouse after other crops are history.

What about **Yukon** - Smallanthus sonchifolius? "Never heard of it!", I hear you reply. Quite honestly I think that is probably for the best. Another vegetable which was worth trying once. Looks like a potato, grows like a Jerusalem artichoke, tastes (so they say) a bit like a pear. In other words, it can't make its mind up. It is another tuber from South America and also doesn't bulk up until autumn. It comes into its own when mixed with other flavours in cooking, as it has a tendency to absorb sauces and dressings.

You will have heard of **sweet potato** *lpomoea batatas*, and this is a crop which I had long been meaning to try when I was given a couple of plants from a friend in the nursery business. I know they are traditionally grown in warmer climates so decided to experiment and treat one with TLC and grow it in a large pot in the greenhouse while the other one, in an identical pot and growing medium, was put outside in a fairly sunny, sheltered spot. I had virtually the same weight of crop from both pots and so would try these again. However they are so cheap and easily available in the shops that I don't know whether it is worth the effort.



Sweet potato

There are many others, too numerous to mention - so I will! **Green nutmeg tomato** - a striped green tomato which does best as ground cover and you know when the tomatoes are ready to pick when they turn a slightly darker shade of orangey -green. **Cucamelon** - a tiny curcurbit which has absolutely no flavour whatsoever but is quite prolific. **Blue Coco bean** - which would be good if thy kept their colour when cooked but on the dinner plate look exactly like green French beans.

Well, you've got to try everything once (except incest and folk dancing!) so no doubt I will continue to cover the vegetable patch with strange looking flora and the dinner plates with strange looking vegetables and continue to get strange looks from anyone who eats at High Trees.

But, as they say in Morrison's - "Naturally wonky; naturally wonderful!"

By investing between ± 100 and $\pm 100,000$ in a Share Account, UK residents enable Shared Interest to provide much needed finance across the globe. Last year alone, Shared Interest helped over 400 organisations in 58 countries. Fairtrade honey co-operative Apicoop, in Chile - whose farmers regularly face earthquakes and volcanic eruptions - moved into blueberry production with a Shared Interest loan.

Chino says, "Due to the last eruption, we lost 5,000 hives, which is a significant number for the beekeepers in that area of Southern Chile. Luckily, because we are a co-operative, we don't just rely on one area for our production. We moved into blueberries so as to not put all of our eggs into one basket. It was a way of protecting ourselves 'just in case'. Never think your small contribution cannot make a difference. Every bee that enters one of our hives can only carry a very tiny amount of nectar. But when you open our hives and they are bursting with honey, you realise how each bee has played its part."

The community came together on Saturday March 9^{th} to hear about the proposals to keep Boxies, our village shop & café open & to transfer ownership to the community.



After a short presentation detailing how the community could take ownership of Boxies, the audience of over 120 people were asked to vote on 4 questions:

- I) Do you want a village shop & café ? A resounding YES was the response
- 2) Would you join the management team to run a community owned shop & cafe? -17 people volunteered to discuss this further
- Would you be prepared to volunteer in a community owned shop/café or to offer other key support? - 50 people showed interest in learning more
- 4) Would you be interested in owning shares in the business? There was plenty of interest in the room at £25 a share

With such great support shown, there looks to be a bright future for Boxies as a community owned shop and café. Now we all need to rally round and get it done.

Until the management team are up and running, volunteers are in place and ownership transferred, Boxies will continue to operate with reduced opening hours & staff from **8am to 2pm 7 days a week** starting March 25th.







Thinking in school about what the season of Lent is about, on Shrove Tuesday the children participated in some traditional pancake races out on the school playground.









RECIPE

"Chocky What's Its"

Naughty but nice - perhaps to enjoy after Lent!



75g granulated or caster sugar 75g butter or margarine

I tablespoonful syrup

3 teaspoonsful cocoa or drinking chocolate

225g digestive biscuits

225g block of cooking chocolate

Melt the sugar, butter/marg, syrup and cocoa/drinking chocolate gently in a saucepan: don't boil.

Crush (or use a mixer) the digestive biscuits to create crumbs.

Put the crumbs in a bowl and pour over the melted ingredients. Stir well and turn into tin, levelling mixture without pressing too hard.

In a double saucepan (or a bowl floating in a saucepan containing boiling water), melt chocolate, spread it over the mixture in the tin and mark it into pieces before it's completely set. (If you forget to mark it out, dip a sharp knife into hot water, quickly dry it and cut.)

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
