From Father Peter

Every year, our Holy Week and Easter liturgy here at Boxgrove invites us to walk with Jesus step by step through the last week of his life, into the mystery of death and resurrection. Through the beauty of worship, we participate in the enthusiasm of the crowd as Jesus enters Jerusalem in triumph on Palm Sunday: and then feel how quickly adulation turns to violence. On Maundy Thursday we are washed, fed and loved in the tenderness of Jesus' last supper finally watching with him as he bears the agony of what is to come in the solitude of Gethsemanae. On Good Friday in a church stripped of all colour and ornament we watch with bewildered and breaking hearts as our Lord dies a criminal's death on the cross. And we wait and wonder as he passes from death to life, to greet us with overwhelming joy at the Easter Vigil, a joy which spills over into Easter Sunday with joy and beauty.

The liturgy helps to shape us as Christians, preparing us for the deaths and resurrections in our own lives. It draws us closer in community. It changes us, strengthens us to witness to the risen Lord. When we have walked the whole way of the cross, our experience of Easter is far richer and more joyful.

Our Holy Week and Easter Services can be found in this Newsletter. I hope you will join the parish community at The Priory for as many of these as you can - bring your friends! All are most welcome.

But I should also like to point out that Boxgrove Priory is YOUR CHURCH your Christian Spiritual Home. I am aware that this News letter goes through the letter boxes of all of you in the Parish. It reflects the whole prism of life we share as a village..... I for one have found some of the adverts very useful! So I wish to use this opportunity to remind you all that the doors of the Priory are open seven days a week during daylight. Open not just for worship and sightseers but for all of you. This beautiful building which has stood over the centuries as a witness to the presence of God amongst us welcomes you.

Pop in for a moment of quiet and reflection. Offer a prayer for someone or some situation. Light a candle as a sign of the warmth and light such prayers can bring. Just sit quietly, soak up the years of prayer. No mobile phone, no noise no pressures from work the kids or who ever. YOU AND GOD this is your haven, your place to recharge.

Boxgrove Neighbourhood Plan Update

The results of the survey carried out following the Neighbourhood Plan Open meeting have now been presented to the Boxgrove Parish Council at the March PC meeting. These results are now posted on the website for all to see, the link at the bottom of this notice can be used to view these.

As we advised last month, essentially, most residents are in favour of the proposed housing developments in the parish and our NP Policies, but against the commercial and industrial proposals at Temple Bar and Boxgrove Quarry.

The report contains details of the suggestions that have been made for infrastructure improvement that could be financed from the CIL payments that will be raised from the building of the developments. These suggestions will be discussed and considered by the Parish Council in due course.

Our modified Neighbourhood Plan has been commented on by the statutory consultees over the last 6 weeks. We now have considered these and where necessary will be modifying the plan accordingly. These changes will be incorporated into the plan, presented to the PC in April and if they are accepted will be submitted to CDC as part of the next stage later in April for a further period of consultation.

It is likely that our finalised NP will be subject to a referendum of the residents in the Autumn.

It is expected that the planning application for the Folly development will be submitted soon. Comments can still be submitted for or against the Temple Bar and Boxgrove Quarry developments on the CDC planning website.

NEWS FROM THE BOXGROVE BELLES

Due to the deadlines for The Bugle submissions, we have had two of our monthly meetings since I wrote for the March issue.

Our February speaker was Dave Winsor who gave a very interesting and enlightening talk about the work of the Kent; Sussex; and Surrey (KSS) Air Ambulance Service. He detailed the set-up of the Service, which started as the Kent Air Ambulance and later incorporated both Sussex and Surrey. Dave explained that the Service is voluntary funded and this involves a lot of fundraising throughout the area on a continual basis.

As an independent Service, the NHS will request the support of the KSS Air Ambulance Service, but their response is dependent on many factors, not least of all, the weather and if it is safe to fly. The KSS Air Ambulance Service has a doctor on each flight which enables a greater level of anaesthesia to be administered at the incident site, as well as emergency, life-saving surgery at the 'roadside'.



The KSS are in the process of changing the livery on their helicopters and road vehicles to red – Belles' members wore red to acknowledge this change.

Our March speaker was Graham Minett, a local author, who spoke about his writing journey into being a published author; he now has four of his novels published and has a contract to write a further two. Some of the Boxgrove Belles' members had heard Graham speak previously when he attended a Boxgrove WI literary lunch; he had spoken so well and proven so entertaining, that his talk to the Belles was greatly anticipated – he did not disappoint.

April will be our Second Birthday meeting on Wednesday 9th April at 2pm in the St Blaise Hall. We will be celebrating with birthday cake and an assortment of cakes and savouries. Dawn Gracie will be entertaining us with a selection of burlesque and cabaret from her repertoire. Many may already know of her through her performances locally at the Chichester Cabaret Club and at events such as at Goodwood.

The Boxgrove Belles' Craft Group is supporting the Cascading Poppies display, being organised by Jane Barnes from the village shop. This will be in the Priory later in the year, in recognition of the cessation of hostilities at the final end of WWII. We are making poppies in an assortment of designs using knitting; crochet; paper; and sewing/patchwork. The Craft Group meets at 2pm on the 4th Monday of the month, in the St Blaise Hall.

Making the Most of Technology: Advice for Those Living with Sight Loss

4Sight Vision Support supports blind and sight impaired children and adults, their families and carers, across West Sussex. Their free services help clients maintain independence, with advice on education, employment, obtaining financial assistance, social activities, and health and wellbeing. In addition, a key area of their expertise is an Accessible Technology Service, to help clients with daily tasks following sight loss.

Equipment such as magnification tools or adapted lighting may at first spring to mind, but every day more technologies are becoming available which can be adapted to support varying needs.

For example, a Smart Speaker can access news, weather forecasts and talking books; set alarms and reminders, and manage a daily calendar. A wide choice of phone apps can access public transport information, read written documents to you and control your central heating remotely. Other technologies can help monitor emails, convert text to audio, and by scanning codes using apps such as Navilens, provide information on food packaging, public



signage and public transport to name a few. The built-in screen reader on a TV will provide information about what programmes are audio described, and settings on a PC screen can adjust the display to suit those with impaired vision.

The Optimistic Gardener

Beautiful Bantams - part 2

Last month I wrote (at length) about our adventures with the new incubator and hatching a number of bantam chicks. I didn't mean to witter on quite so much about their early days but unless you have been involved in the process of producing life from a breakfast item you can't know how eggsiting it is. Last eggrelated pun I promise.

The chicks were reared safely in a brooder in the utility room with a heat lamp to act as the mother hen with chick crumbs and water away from the heat for them to discover. But it soon became clear that we would need to move them out into the big wide world when they needed cleaning out daily to avoid a public health hazard.

So at the age of 7 weeks their world changed completely. From the cosy confines of the High Trees utility room they found themselves out in the fresh air in what we laughingly call the Bantam Palace. (See pic in last month's Bugle) This consists of a structure on two levels - sleeping quarters above and dining room below as well as an area to shelter from the weather.

The coop is attached to a large fruit cage which is fox-proof and accessible to the hens through a pop-hole from the Bantam Palace. But at the age of 7 weeks we decided they weren't ready for the big wide world and the possibility of coming face-to-face with the local rodents so they were confined for a couple of weeks to the immediate confines of the Palace.

They took a while to learn the skill of climbing the ladder into their bedroom. So each evening in those early days we could be found scrooched down in the cage making rugby tackle lunges to catch each bird and put her (and him) to bed! Fortunately for our backs and knees it didn't take too long for them to work this out for themselves.

The next stage in their development was to be let out, little by little, into the big wide world. At first we provided a mini-caged area within the rolling acres of the fruit cage. This comprised 4 netted panels which we constructed next to the pop-hole so that they could experience the sky overhead something they had not yet done. Again this took them a while to investigate, but once one had led the way the rest poked out their beaks and revelled in the plat-du-jour provided by scratching around in the soil.

A fortnight later we took away the frames and gave them free-run of the fruit cage. If we ever thought to get any more gooseberries, blackcurrants or loganberries from this structure we were living in cloud-cuckoo land. The very first thing they did when released into the whole space was to dash over to the fruit bushes and gorge on their lower leaves. It never ceases to amaze me why, with the variety of a hen's diet, they don't keel over more often with food poisoning. But they will try absolutely anything -

particularly if it wriggles! Now you can see them as fully grown birds perhaps I had better introduce you to the

various breeds we succeeded in hatching.

The most numerous (three) are a variety called the silver laced Wyandotte. From the word 'go' they have been the feistiest of all the birds but, in true 'ugly-

heard of.

But my current favourites are the 2 New

Hampshire Reds who have the most gorgeous golden feathers. They are a breed which was developed in New Hampshire US from the Rhode Island red which many of you will have

duckling' fashion, they have turned into the most beautiful bantams with an intricate feather pattern.

There are 2 hens and I cockerel.

The dumb blond which was the last to emerge from her egg and, the only archetypal Easter chick, turned out to be a Light Sussex bantam.

We named her Marilyn

They are not at the top of the pecking order but they are fearless and very docilethey will feed out of your hand as you can see.

The final breed we have is the Pekin. There is one of each sex. The hen is a lavender Pekin - a soft Smokey grey in colour and quite cuddly in appearance. She is decidedly at the bottom of the pecking order - poor dear!

The cock is also a Pekin but with an extraordinary appearance. At first, as a young chick, he developed tips to his wing feathers which were longer than normal and stuck outwards; for this reason I named him The Caped Crusader. But as he grew, more and more of his feathers took on a backward growing appearance so he looked

like he was having a really bad hair-day! As a possessor of a mop of curly hair I can empathise with him.

And as a full-grown cockerel he defies description!

He **is** a Pekin but he has what is called a frizzle gene. This is not a breed but the result of a genetic mutation that affects the feather structure.

So out of the 8 chicks which we hatched we have 6 hens and 2 cockerels. RESULT!



Unfortunately keeping both the cockerels was not wise with such a small flock and bantam cocks are notoriously feisty with other cockerels. Some of you may remember Jake Thackray's song *The Bantam Cock* - if not I recommend you Google it; very funny!

So since the Silver Laced Wyandotte was considerably larger than Frizzle (as he just **had** to be called) we moved Big Boy (as **he** just **had** to be called) in with the big girls in the main hen-house. They had been a harem without a Sultan for a considerable time and took a little while to get used to this young stud!

So now we have 2 contented flocks - each with their own Lord & Master - and we have the yellowest scrambled eggs you will find anywhere.



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
