

I cannot promise you a "flaming June" as far as the weather is concerned, but I can promise a month set alight by the joys and celebration of our wonderful Christian Faith.

Van Diemen's Wood is under threat



West Sussex Fire and Rescue Service have expressed serious concerns about the fire risk posed by the proposed Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) at the former quarry site. As a result, an additional emergency access route has been proposed—one that would cut directly through Van Diemen's Wood and permanently alter the character of Tinwood Lane.

This is no ordinary woodland.

Van Diemen's Wood is a designated Priority Habitat, home to a diverse range of wildlife. The environmental damage from this access route would be severe, irreversible, and entirely avoidable.

From the Parish Council, May 2025

First, my thanks to Cllr. Mike Howton for his contribution to The May issue of the Bugle magazine highlighting the work of our Rangers, and good work it is that they do!



The closing date for contributions for the June issue is the 15th so I propose to write a page this month, there is little time available to meet the deadline. The street sized Poppies arrived in good time and are displayed throughout Halnaker and Boxgrove including side streets, the flag of St. George is flying at the Almshouses since 23/04, not the 28th as dictated by the Church. And as planned, the beacon basket was placed adjacent to the Windmill and lit at dusk, 8.45 pm to be precise. It burnt well aided by the strong wind blowing from the east, but away from the fire it was cold! My thanks to Robert Langmead for opening both gates to allow access Thursday and Friday morning. Approximately 20 folk made the trip up to the beacon, they all enjoyed the experience.

Thanks also to Jim MacDonald for saving the scrap timber and my neighbour, Paul Procter who helped me erect the basket and Cllr. Julian Moore for assistance on the night. We did have a report from a resident in Bognor who saw the beacon. It was disappointing that no other activity had been planned to mark the 80th year since the war ended in 1945 due, essentially, to a distinct lack of enthusiasm for a Fish and Chip supper accompanied by old time music during the early evening. This had been proposed by the Village Hall management, well advertised, but due to the lack of interest and bookings, it was cancelled.

However, a few residents did meet up in the garden of the St. Blaise Centre and enjoyed an afternoon themed tea and cakes hastily assembled by two or three residents.

The faulty mower has been attended to and looking across the playing field this morning 09/05 looks in splendid condition for the 2025 cricket season. And! We've been furnished with the season's fixture list, thank you the Cricket Club.

Yet another serious, though injury free, accident at the black spot, New Road and its intersection with the A285. A BMW failed to stop and tore the front n/s corner off a passing 55 Stagecoach bus. When will WSCC acknowledge that the sign warning of the junction is only 4 metres from the advisory stop line and introduce a warning further back up New Road. I'm actually waiting to hear back from Jeremy as it was to him I immediately reported the incident, expecting some positive response. Surely this doesn't require a time consuming TRO to implement action before a fatal accident occurs.

Goodwood and Rolls-Royce Team Up to Preserve the Trundle

Goodwood has completed vital conservation work to protect one of the area's most treasured landmarks – the Trundle, an ancient hillfort with sweeping views across Chichester, Bognor Regis, Portsmouth, and the Isle of Wight.

The ramparts of the Trundle have deteriorated quite drastically in recent years, particularly during lockdown when the area became a much-loved escape for local walkers. With footfall and weather taking their toll, Goodwood worked closely with both Rolls-Royce Motor Cars and Historic England to carry out sensitive repairs. A new layer of chalk – covering just over 1,000 square metres – has now been laid across the most worn parts of the ramparts. This "sacrificial" layer is designed to protect the ancient structure underneath while making the surface safer and more even for walkers.

Although the route over the Trundle isn't a formal public footpath, Goodwood recognises its value to the community. This project means locals and visitors can continue to enjoy the views for years to come, without damaging the monument itself. Annual monitoring will now form part of Goodwood's ongoing conservation efforts, to ensure the Trundle remains resilient against further wear and tear.

This project is part of Goodwood's broader commitment to sustainability, heritage preservation, and enhancing the quality of life for those who live, work, and walk in and around the Estate.

The Optimistic Gardener Don't let the weeds get ahead of you

For months we look at grey skies and brown stems of plants, longing for those longer days when we can enjoy all our meals outside, feast on strawberries and gaze at the iPad screen looking at the app called *Merlin* which tells us what birds we are being serenaded by.

Then that time arrives and we look at blue skies and the emerging stems of the summer's bounty. We enjoy the epicurean delights of the vegetable patch and hear the cuckoo once again. But everything comes with a price! And this one is the need to keep on top of the weeds.

If you have been reading my 'column' for the last few years you may have gathered that our approach here at High Trees is quite relaxed with regards to tidiness (both inside and out). The lawns which were once scrupulously shaved once a week now have a long-haired hippy appearance in many areas (See pic right). So we now allow plants to linger which in former times would have been looked on as weeds. Meadow cranesbill (a wild geranium) romps across the area leading down to the hen house. Red campion (Silene Dioica) and Ragged Robin light up the woodland border. Ox-eye daisies pop up in the most unexpected places around the garden.



In fact all these 'weeds' are closely related to the highly prized garden varieties which we purchase at great price from the garden centre. Geranium Rozanne is the Chelsea plant of the centenary and not a million miles from Geranium pratense (the meadow cranesbill) in the same family. Lychnis coronaria (Rose Campion) - which has an RHS award of garden merit - shares a common ancestor with red campion. And the Ox-eye Daisy which decorates road verges up and down the country is a parent of the Shasta Daisy.

So what makes a weed? It really depends on your point of view.

According to the Merriam-Webster dictionary:

A weed is a plant that is not valued where it is growing and is usually of vigorous growth especially one that tends to overgrow or choke out more desirable plants

There are 2 main types of plants which may be considered as weeds - annual and perennial. The former are plants which complete their life cycle in one season producing the next generation as seeds (though sometimes in their thousands) and are a bit of a nuisance but can be quite easy to control. The real headache as far as I am concerned are the perennial weeds which are vigorous, long-lived and fast spreading.

Bindweed, Bramble, Couch grass, Buttercup Dandelion, Enchanter's nightshade Ground elder, Mare's tail, Japanese knotweed Stinging nettles, Creeping thistle, Dock

Listed like this one can almost imagine they would create a poetic garden in which Peaseblossom and Puck would gambol by moonlight. But if these plants were all that your garden contained it would be Nightmare on Elm Street and not Midsummer Night's Dream.

We loathe the idea of using poisons around the garden. After all some of them persist in the soil and it has been found that, given certain soil and weather conditions, the most commonly used weed killer, glyphosate, can leach into waterways.

The best way to treat vigorous perennial weeds which you don't want, is to tackle them at the earliest sign of growth. An effective but exhausting way of combatting perennial weeds is thoroughly to dig out all the roots. Even scraps of root left in the soil can produce new plants. Also if possible to keep them in check by covering them with light-excluding material for at least a year. Of course this isn't always possible.

The bindweed which abseils in from the fields that surround our garden is almost impossible to eradicate by digging or covering to exclude the light. So we have 2 options. Learn to love it - at least in the hedging that surrounds the garden, or train it up canes and then unwind the growth and pop into a waterproof bag in which one sparingly sprays some glyphosate. In recent years we are learning to pull the majority of the stems and enjoy the pretty white flowers of those which 'got away'.

Why is it we pay oodles of money to have one of these in the garden and treat the other with such disdain?

There are times with some weeds when the only thing to be done is remove all the plants you want to keep and put them in a temporary position for a year; this can be in the ground elsewhere or in large pots. This takes some doing but saves time in the end and gives you the opportunity to rearrange your border.

We have a border in the front garden which has been treated this way recently. I was having great problems with couch grass (Elymus repens) which is a fast-growing invasive perennial grass whose roots become entwined with those of plants you want and is almost impossible to eliminate. So, with help, I lifted all the plants I wanted to keep (which was far too many) - being careful to remove the roots of the couch grass as I went.

Then I left the area fallow for a few months - removing any of the couch, ground Ivy and oxalis that returned - and in the Spring I sowed a packet of mixed wild flower seeds for the summer. It should have been a glorious display of cornflowers, marigolds, poppies and chamomile daisies but rather disappointingly the dominant flower to come through was the corncockle - so the summer was a blaze of purple.

In the autumn (2023) I replanted the border with some of the old plants and some new ones I had produced from cuttings and sowing. I added some slabs of a recently felled tree to act as stepping stones, making access to the back of the bed possible without treading on the soil.

And I am far more likely to stop the weeds getting ahead of me now. As I write this in May I am enjoying the fireworks of Alliums and looking forward to the late-summer colour of the Salvias.



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


