The Treasurer writes....

Supporting Boxgrove Priory in Challenging Times

Dear Friends,

For over **900 years**, Boxgrove Priory has stood at the heart of our parish — a place of prayer, beauty and community. Generations have come here to worship, to mark life's milestones, and to find peace and comfort. The Priory is not only a sacred building, but also a living witness to the faith and devotion of countless people across the centuries.

Today, however, we face significant financial challenges. Like so many households, our costs have risen sharply in recent years, particularly energy bills and maintenance expenses. At the same time, our income has not kept pace, leaving us in a very difficult position. Despite every effort to reduce our spending, we are now having to make some hard choices.

One of the most visible concerns is the **maintenance of the churchyard**. We take great pride in how beautiful and well-kept it looks — something many visitors remark upon. Despite its significant size, it has always been carefully tended, providing a place of remembrance, peace and reflection for all who visit. Yet the simple cost of cutting the grass now stands at **£5,700 per year**. Without additional support, we will sadly be forced to reduce, or even stop, grass-cutting in part or all of the churchyard at the end of this year. This is not a step we take lightly. Another change concerns the *Boxgrove Bugle*. After this issue, we will no longer be able to deliver it to every home in printed form, something we have done for over 30 years. From October, the Bugle will be available digitally on the Priory website, with a link also posted on the Priory Facebook page. A small number of printed copies will still be left each month in the Priory, the Village Shop and the Village Hall for people to collect. If you would still like a printed copy delivered through your door, please contact the Churchwardens (see the contact details on the 'Who's Who' page).

We are deeply grateful for the generous support many already give. But if you are able to help further — even just a few pounds each month — it would make a real difference. Small, regular gifts add up to steady, reliable income that helps us plan and care for the Priory and its churchyard.


We use craft activities, games, songs and stories to help us learn more about Christian teachings.

POPPIES AT THE PRIORY





A short service of remembrance and dedication of the poppy cascade in the Priory took place on Sunday 17th August; a wreath was then laid at the grave of Billy Fiske. This was to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of WWII, the 85th anniversary of Tangmere airfield having been bombed, and the death of Billy Fiske on 17th August 1940.



William Meade Lindsley Fiske III was born 4 June 1911 in Chicago. He travelled to the UK after World War II broke out and joined the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, claiming to be Canadian in order to enlist; the USA had not entered the war at that time. Based at Tangmere aerodrome, he participated in the Battle of Britain and was killed in action. He was the first American serviceman to die in WWII, and is buried in the Priory churchyard.

The perils of friendly, village Sunday cricket reared its head during June and July when three fixtures were unfortunately cancelled due to sides not being able to make I I players. Our away visits to Petworth Park and Storrington were both cancelled due to the hosts not being able to raise a squad, and our return fixture against Singleton was curtailed due to Boxgrove not having a full cohort. However, since the last update we've not only had 5 entertaining games, we've also received our lovely new shirts, sponsored by Glanvilles Solicitors.

15th June – Singleton CC (94/8) vs Boxgrove CC (95/4)

Boxgrove secured the win in the local rivalry after limiting the hosts runs. John Arman opened his bowling career for Boxgrove with 4 wickets for 18 runs, and Robin Wilcox ended the bowling with 3 wickets for 14 runs, narrowly missing out on a hat-trick leaving Boxgrove a small total to chase. Boxgrove gained the runs in 18 overs, with John Arman getting 39 and Eli Geraets getting 17 as the top scorers.

22nd June – Boxgrove CC (78/2) vs Clanfield CC (74 all out)

Age was the factor when Boxgrove's potentially youngest bowling attack ever put on a clinic, making quick work of Clanfield. 6 bowlers, aged between 13 and 19, all took wickets to limit Clanfield to 74 from 20 overs. After the youth shone, the two eldest players of John Arman and Rob Comins shared a partnership of 70 before Roman Geraets hit the winning runs to secure the result in 10 overs.

6th July - Boxgrove CC (172/7) vs Shirrell Heath CC (170/5)

Boxgrove secured their third win in a row in a rain-interrupted game. Five wickets fell across the Shirrell Heath 35 overs, with all of them catches – three taken by James Callnon. After an extended Tea period, Boxgrove secured the win in 27 overs, with Rob Foy scoring an impressive 74 in 50 balls, with 11 fours and 2 sixes, and strong batting performances from Eli Geraets and club captain James Thorpe who secured the win.

13th July - Fittleworth CC (265/3) vs Boxgrove (95 all out)

Boxgrove faced an uphill struggle early on, with Fittleworth scoring 43 runs within the first 3 overs, on their way to a commanding victory. Rob Comins attempted to aid Boxgrove's return, scoring 50 off 51 balls before being caught and once Xander Arman got out for 21 runs, a number of ducks and single figure scores put the contest to bed in the 20th over.

3rd August – Burpham and Warningcamp CC (210/9) vs Boxgrove CC (162 all out)

A young squad with an average age of 20 (only saved by the three elder statesmen of the team) travelled to Burpham for a competitive game which they came up unfortunately short. Burpham opener Barrett scored a quick 64 before finally being caught on the boundary by Robin Wilcox, with Eli Geraets swiftly picking up 3 quick wickets to bring the tie back into Boxgrove's favour. Runs slowed up in the second half of the innings with 13 year old spinner Thomas Young picking up his first two wickets as Burpham scored a catchable 210. John Arman led the charge opening and closing the batting, missing his hundred by 6 runs. But with five of the Boxgrove attack scoring I run a piece, and 3 others scoring single figures, the final wicket fell in the penultimate over.

The Optimistic Gardener Where have all the swallows gone?

I don't know about you but I have really missed seeing swallows this year. Our house in Barnham lies between 2 properties with stables and in the past we have been treated to amazing aerial displays from these graceful acrobats of the sky. But this year I only saw **one** flying overhead - probably off on its holidays to Scotland - and since then, nothing! We've had buzzards, mallards, a family of moorhens, tree creepers and other exotics but no hirundines.



House martins, sand martins and swallows all fall into the category of 'hirundines' but swifts - though as agile as these other birds - are more closely related to hummingbirds! Swifts are also low in number this year in the UK. In the past I have written

about our experimenting with swift boxes. The residents of our two swift boxes so far have been house sparrows and blue tits. Despite playing a looped recording of the screeching of swifts for 4 hours a day during one (very long) summer, we have had no prospective buyers for our des res.

Swifts and hirundines are aerial insectivores. They like nothing better than hanging around with their mates especially in areas such as open fields, ponds and other wetlands. This is because these are the habitats where they are most likely to find their menu of choice. Bugs!

Their long, pointy wings and streamlined bodies are well suited to this type of hunting - but only if the insects are there in any numbers.

I recently paid a visit to a National Trust property in the centre of Wisbech. No - I hadn't heard of it either! Wisbech is a small market town on the fens between Cambridgeshire and Lincolnshire. As you may know, the Fens are a major agricultural area producing many vegetables, potatoes and sugar beet. You have probably eaten something from Lincolnshire today - unless you grow-your-own! But I was shocked at the lack of insect life and bird song.

The property which we were renting was in the grounds of a beautiful 4 acre garden which was at its absolute best in May/ June. Roses they had in abundance, flowering shrubs such as philadelphus assaulted the nostrils as I walked around and the

herbaceous borders were stuffed full of bee food plants. They even had 3 hives nestling in a quiet



corner humming with the little buzzers in the heat of the day.

But as I sat and watched as I drank my morning coffee or quaffed a cool glass of Prosecco (in the evening - I should add!) there was no sign of any other insect life in the garden. Where were the damselflies with their gauzy wings? Why could I not

hear the insistent drone of the bumble bees? And why was I not being serenaded by the robins and blackbirds as I was at home - even after the other birds are all tucked up in their nests?

I have no scientific evidence to quote to you about this particular area of England but it doesn't take Sherlock Holmes to come to the conclusion that the Fens probably have a higher use of herbicides and pesticides than most other parts of the UK. So the insects which feed the birds are simply not there.

Call me an old cynic but I don't think the Fenland farmers are too concerned about insect pollination as much of what they grow to sell is wind pollinated - and boy they have plenty of that in the east coast. So the decline in insect numbers in the UK (60% in the last 20 years according to a report published by Bugs Matter) is not a

subject that worries the growers of wheat, barley and many types of vegetables. But it should!

The reason for the dramatic decline in insect numbers are the usual things we are told: Habitat loss, climate change and pesticide use. The intensive farming which resulted in the postwar drive to become less dependent on food imports meant that intensive farming was a 'Good Thing'. The increased use of fertilisers and pesticides reduces insect populations. And reduced insect populations means reduced bird populations.

Nowadays there are not so many farmyards like those in 'The Darling Buds of May' and there are fewer buildings for insect and bird nesting sites. And of course your average 'new-build' does not have the nooks and crannies which provide suitable nesting sites for swifts and martins.

Some factors causing the decline we can do little about as individuals; I suppose we can do our small part in mitigating the effects of climate change with its unpredictable weather. We can try to use our recycling bins assiduously and rely less on our cars and let the train take the strain! We can holiday closer to home and avoid flying as much as possible.

But with regards our gardens, parks, verges etc. we do have a chance to make an impact. OK - so parks and verges may be a bit trickier but in our own patches of land - however small or large - we can make changes. Do we really need a perfectly striped lawn, shorn to within an inch of its life?



Is this the perfect lawn?

Or can we provide birds and insects with a habitat and food store which will encourage them to our small patch?



A perfect lawn is silent and a wildlife garden sings!

We can take all those chemicals lurking in the garden shed down to the tip - after all most pesticides are broad-spectrum meaning that they harm a wide range of insects - not just the targeted pests.

We can plant trees, shrubs and flowers which provide insects and thus birds with food sources not found in fields of mono crops which have been nuked to provide us with our Wheatabix.

We can join organisations like the RSPB and the Sussex Wildlife Trust who are working to protect habitats.

So if you want future generations to hear the buzzing of bumble bees and the screeching of swifts then don't leave it to others to do the right thing. If you want to see flocks of swallows swooping over the fields and ponds and marvel at the bats as the sun goes down - then change your ideas about what a perfect lawn should look like. After all the "perfect" lawn is silent and the wildlife garden sings!





Your Vision Matters - Supporting National Eye Health Week

4Sight Vision Support (4SVS) is once again proud to support National Eye Health Week with its theme this year of 'vision really matters'. Running from $22^{nd} - 28^{th}$ September, this annual awareness-raising campaign promotes good eye health for all – reminding us to get regular eye health checks, and highlighting how lifestyle choices like diet, exercise and screen time affect your vision and can help you make better decisions.

Regular eye health checks can detect early signs of conditions, including glaucoma, which can be treated if found soon enough, as well as diabetes or high blood pressure. Those with sight loss should continue to attend regular checkups as further changes in the eyes can help make the best use of remaining vision and prevent any unnecessary further sight loss. Eye health checks are free for certain people; the NHS website has all the eligibility criteria and information.

In terms of lifestyle, diet, exercise and screen time, affect vision: a healthy balanced diet is ideal, not just for vision but for overall health and wellbeing. Scientific evidence suggests that exercise may reduce the risk of sight loss as it increases the supply of oxygen to the optic nerve. For those using a computer screen, it is recommended to take frequent breaks – try the 20, 20, 20 rule – take a 20 second break, every 20 minutes and look at something at least 20 feet away.
